Only flagged obstacles to be attempted & give way to riders travelling at higher speeds.

All dogs must be kept on leads please

Rules and regulations

1. At or in the vicinity of any Findon Riding Club event, everyone mounted, whether competing or not must wear a hard hat conforming to the minimum safety standards, with a harness properly adjusted and fastened. Failure to do so will incur elimination of the horse and/or rider from the competition. Hats marked EN 1384, PAS 015 or prefixed with ASTM or SEI are the minimum standard allowed. Hard hats to the specification of PAS 015 and ASTM 1163 are considered to offer greater protection than EN 1384. Recommended hard hats should carry the quality assurance stamp of Kitemark or SEI. American standard SNELL E95 and Australian/New Zealand standard SNZ 3838 1998 are also acceptable. Where a hat is of skull cap style, this must be worn with a silk.
2. Body Protectors and Medical Armbands MUST be worn.
3. Disclaimer of liability – save for death or personal injury caused by negligence of the organisers or anyone for whom they are in law responsible, neither the organisers of any event to which these rules apply, nor the British Horse Society, nor the agent, employee or representative of these bodies accepts any liability for any accident, loss, damage, injury, or illness to horses, owners, riders, spectators, land or any person or property whatsoever, whether caused by negligence, breach of contract or in any way whatsoever.
4. Dogs must be kept on leads at all times.
5. The making of an entry implies acceptance of the conditions listed above.

What is a Hunter Pace?

You basically turn up at any point during the day between the times shown on the schedule. You pay your entry fee, get a number and head down to the collecting ring when you are ready. Sometimes it may be quiet and you will get to go to the start as soon as you have warmed up and sometimes it might be busy and you have to declare when you want to go. When you go out of the start box you can go at whatever pace you want and jump any jump that is flagged at any height, or miss out any jump. You may overtake others or may be overtaken. You can 'hack' around the course or go at a Cross Country Pace. You can also ride around in pairs. The aim of a Hunter pace is that you cannot get eliminated (although if you are having problems at a fence and someone comes up behind you, then you MUST move aside to let them jump the fence!) Hunter Paces are a great fun place to start doing Cross Country with no pressure.
